Summer is fast approaching and the weather will soon be getting warmer, so I wanted to provide some important information to protect from the heat of the summer.

Heat Exposure

To evaluate degree of heat exposure in a vehicle, we compared the temperature rise inside an enclosed, dark-colored vehicle with the temperature rise in a light-colored vehicle with the windows partly open. Within 20 minutes, readings in both cars exceeded 125°F and reached approximately 140°F in 40 minutes--a temperature rise of over 45°F.

A person who is unable to remove himself from an enclosed vehicle is at risk for a life-threatening crisis if left alone in a sun-exposed car for even a relatively short period of time. Children and pets should never be left in an automobile even for a short period of time. When the body is exposed to extreme temperatures serious harm can occur.

Although heat-related illness and death occur primarily among the elderly, infants are also at risk. Heat exhaustion and heat stroke can occur rapidly in enclosed vehicles.

It's a fact: Overexposure to the sun can result in skin cancer later in life. What are your family's risks from exposure to powerful UV rays? Consider these facts and statistics.

The Dangers of UV Exposure

- You can sunburn even on a cloudy day.
- On average, children get 3 times more exposure than adults.
- Concrete, sand, water, and snow reflect 85% to 90% of the sun's UV rays.
- Depletion of Earth's ozone continues to increase your exposure to UV rays.

Skin Cancer

- In some parts of the world, melanoma is increasing at rates faster than any other cancer.
- More than 1.2 million new cases of skin cancer are diagnosed each year in the US.
- Melanoma, the deadliest form of skin cancer, kills one person every hour.
- One blistering sunburn can double a child's lifetime risk of developing skin cancer.

Safety Tips to Prevent Brush, Grass, and Forest Fires



Brush and grass fires can sometimes start from natural causes, like lightning. However, according to the National Fire Protection Association, these types of fires can often be prevented by following a few simple safety rules.

General Prevention

- Place cigarette butts in metal containers. Do not throw them on the ground or into vegetation.
- Leave fireworks to the professionals. Do not use consumer fireworks.
- Follow the recommendations at www.firewise.org to make your home and landscaping more resistant to fire, specifically "How to Have a Firewise Home."
- Reduce the risk from sparks by being sure nothing is dragging from your vehicle, keeping tires properly inflated, and being careful when using lawn mowers or other equipment.

Outdoor burning



Be aware of, and comply with, any local ordinances or permit requirements pertaining to outdoor or open air burning including:

- Campfires
- Brush fires
- Fire pits
- Outdoor fireplaces

You may not be permitted to do outdoor burning in some municipalities and during some seasons.

Closely attend all outdoor fires. Be sure to put out the fire completely before leaving.

Avoid burning on windy, dry days

When conditions are windy or dry, it is too easy for open burning to spread out of control.

Do not use gasoline or other flammable or combustible liquids to burn brush, trash, or other waste.
